## This Week at St. John's

January 19, 2025

### **About the Readings**

#### Isaiah 62:1-5

The sense of celebration at the Cana Wedding (Gospel story for today) is also expressed in the reading from Isaiah, as the Lord's power is manifested through the return of Israel from exile. To once again take possession of Mt. Zion was a victory, but not in the sense of a military triumph. There would now be a new era in which the holy city of Jerusalem would be restored. As the glory of Jerusalem would rise, Israel would be vindicated against the nations that had mocked the Holy City's ruin. Zion's glory and salvation would become a shining lamp for all the nations to see: a "crown of beauty" and a "royal diadem" (62:3).

#### Corinthians 12:1-11

The Epistle begins a series of readings from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians. In today's passage, the power of the Lord is manifested through the gifts of the Spirit. Here Paul speaks to help his converts make sense of the fullness of life they now experience through Jesus Christ by contrasting this new life with their former pagan existence. No one acknowledges Jesus as Lord except through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. And no one speaking by God's Spirit curses Jesus. Paul goes on to identify the varieties of gifts the Spirit might impart. All the gifts have their source in God who acts in all of them. The gifts are always for the common good and not for an individual's personal enhancement. The gifts include wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, the working of miracles, prophecy, discernment of spirits, tongues, and the interpretation of tongues. The community needs all of these gifts; and the Spirit confers upon each believer the particular gifts needed for the service to which he or she has been called.

#### John 2:1-11

Today's Gospel passage is the account of the wedding at Cana— a story unique to the Gospel of John and the first of John's seven signs or miracles (2:1-12; 4:43-54; 5:1-15; 6:1-15; 6:16-24; 9:1-12; 11:1-44). A Divine sign is significant not so much because of the details of the miracle itself, but because such events point beyond themselves to a new way of life through the Gospel. The Gospel of John sees the whole dynamic activity of God in Christ as a series of signs, so that all the world "may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God," and through believing may have life in his name (20:31).
