## Saint John's Episcopal Church

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### This Week at St. John's

March 16, 2025

### Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18

Our Old Testament passage today tells of God's covenant with Abraham. Abram had responded to God's call to go to a new land with the promise that God would make of him a great nation (Gen. 12:1-3). In the context of a vision, God tells Abram not to be anxious about the future, for the Lord is Abram's shield—his protector—and great will be his reward. Reward is used here in the sense of a gift of grace to those who trust in God and not as a quid pro quo arrangement in which payment is given for a service rendered. Abram asks the Lord what that reward will be, since he and his wife Sarai continue to be childless. Previously God had promised that Abram's line would continue (Gen. 12:7; 13:16). But now it would seem that the offspring of one of his slaves would be his heir. However, the Lord assures Abram with a sign, telling him that his descendants would number as the stars in heaven. Thus, in the face of seeming impossibility, Abram believed. Here faith is understood as living with complete trust in God's future. Abram does not question how the promise of land and descendants will unfold, but accepts that the promise will be fulfilled. Thus "the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness" (15:6).

### **Philippians 3:17-4:1**

In a further reflection of Abram's trust in God, the Apostle Paul urges the congregation at Philippi to "stand firm in the Lord" (Phil. 4:1), as he points out that Christian life is counter to the world's values. He urges them to follow his example by giving up material or "earthly things" (3:19), or they will face destruction, as do those who "live as enemies of the cross of Christ" (v. 18). True Christian citizenship is in heaven where Christ's saving actions will transform believers into the likeness of Christ himself through God's power in Christ (v. 21). In the final verse, Paul's affection for this community, "my joy and crown" (4:1), shines as he urges his brothers and sisters to remain steadfast in their life in Christ.

#### Luke 13:31-35

Jesus also speaks of the choices one must make in order to follow him. The midpoint of the Gospel of Luke in chapter 13 shows Jesus continuing his prophetic teaching as he travels to Jerusalem. Verses 31-33 are unique to Luke, as some Pharisees come to warn Jesus to leave because Herod is seeking to kill him. Although he had not directly threatened Jesus, Herod had imprisoned and beheaded John the Baptist (Lk. 3:19; 9:9). In fact, Herod had indicated a desire to see Jesus (Lk. 9:9). Later on, when Jesus was brought before Herod at his trial, Herod asked Jesus to show him a sign (Lk. 23:8) before finally turning him over to Pilate (Lk. 23:11).

St. John's Outreach has been providing the facility with one meal a month on the third Sunday since 2017.
