Malachi 4:1-2a

The name Malachi (1:1, "my messenger") may be a title rather than a personal name (2:7; 3:1). Concerned for the holiness of worship, worshipers and priests at the temple, Malachi condemns moral and religious abuses.

He frames his teaching in question-and-answer form. The problem is posed: since the wicked prosper, God must not care about evil (2:17). The truth lies in the future. On the day when the Lord acts, those whose names are written in the "book of remembrance" (3:16) will be spared, accomplishing justice for all.

God, "the sun of righteousness" (4:2), will bring not only destructive heat but healing warmth. The book ends with a commentary on 3:1, identifying the messenger to come with Elijah. Much later, John the Baptist was identified with this figure.

2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

The faith community at Thessalonica was concerned with the coming day of the Lord. But some used the conviction that the Second Coming was imminent to forsake their work and wait complacently for the new life. Thus the writer of the Epistle warns against joining those who engage in idle or disorderly conduct. Instead, they are to follow the example of those like Paul, who could have claimed support from others, but instead practiced a trade. The end is indeed promised by God, but no one can predict when it will be. Therefore, Christians are called to be steadfast and carry out their responsibilities in this world as preparation for God's new order. Christian community requires mutual responsibility for the good of all. "Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right" (2 Thess. 3:13).

Luke 21:5-19

As the reading begins, Jesus is teaching outside the temple when someone in the crowd remarks on the beauty of the building. Jesus responds by saying that in the days to come the temple will be destroyed: "Not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down" (21:6). After the return from exile in Babylon, the second temple was completed around 515 B.C. to replace Solomon's temple that had been destroyed in 586 B.C. In the time of Jesus, Herod the Great was enlarging and refurbishing the second temple that represented the very heart of Jewish religious and national identity. Since Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem (Lk. 19:29-38), the temple had been at the center of his activities as he challenged the corruption of the religious authorities. By foretelling the destruction of the temple, Jesus was also proclaiming that the religious institutions of Israel had lost their life-giving properties, and pointing to a new kind of temple in the Kingdom of God.
